





YOUTH GROUP



- Two pairs latex gloves
- One 22-27 count box heavy-duty trash bags (33-45 gallon)
- One 6-14 oz. bottle of insect repellent (drops or lotion, not aerosol)



Fully Human and Fully Divine

The Orthodox Church calendar of scripture readings brings us on the Sunday before Christmas, the genealogy of our Lord, Jesus Christ, as recorded in Chapter One of St. Matthew's gospel. We are presented with the "royal" lineage of our Lord, the lineage of kings going back through King David to the Patriarch Abraham. Why? Because the Messiah, according to Old Testament prophecies, was to come from the royal lineage of King David, and St. Matthew wanted to show that the birth of Jesus fulfilled this prophecy. (St. Luke's gospel presents a different lineage, the "non-royal" or physical, of Jesus, going all the way back to Adam, the first-created, to show Jesus' human ancestry.)

The early Christian Church spent many years debating over the topic of how to define the person of Jesus Christ, ultimately using the phrase, "fully human and fully divine." The Church taught that Jesus was truly the Messiah, and that He was God-incarnate, God become Man. For the apostles Matthew and Luke, the Lord's genealogy was definitely worth writing about; it was a critical part of the Christian gospel.

Commenting on these verses, St. John Chrysostom writes: "Think not, therefore, it is of small things

you are hearing, when you hear of this birth, but rouse up your mind, and straightway tremble, being told that God has come upon earth. For so marvelous was this, and beyond expectation, that because of these things the very angels formed a choir, and in behalf of the world offered up their praise for them, and the prophets from the first were amazed at this, that "He was seen upon earth, and conversed with men (Baruch iii. 37)."

For Christians today, I think it is important to remember these teachings. In today's society Jesus is regarded as many things: a good person, a moral teacher, someone who respects the dignity of all people. And, while all true, those same attributes can be applied to many others throughout history and in our own time as well. But, as Christians, we do ourselves, and God, a disservice by not also adding, "Savior, Master, Redeemer, Lord and God" to make a more complete list, and to help remind us that we're not talking about any other person in human history.

Jesus is God's "only-begotten" Son, there is no other; no other person quite like Jesus. His words may be found among the words of other wise teachers, but not His works. We don't find other men in

history walking on water, healing others who are blind from birth, or paralyzed for years. There aren't other men in history who brought others back to life, and who, Himself, rose from the dead. These divine acts only come from Jesus Christ, the Messiah, God become Man.

Celebrating His birth, His entrance into our world, will always be a sacred celebration; one that shows God's immense love for His people. An appropriate celebration, according to the teachings of the Orthodox Church, is preceded with prayer and fasting, perhaps not so easy during this season, but one that increases spiritual joy and our relationship with God.

May you celebrate our Lord's birth together with your loved ones, may your Christmas be peaceful and joyful, but above all, may your celebration bring to mind God's love by sending His Son, our Savior, into the world for our eternal benefit.

Stewardship – Are you in 100%

As each year comes to a close, we reflect on our accomplishments and anticipate the upcoming year. This December, our parish family of St. Haralambos celebrates 25 years since its founding. From our humble beginnings on 84th Avenue we now number approximately 170 pledged Steward Families. We give thanks to those who came before us and laid the foundations for our Church as it is today. What a wonderful legacy they gave us. Twenty-five years from now, another generation will look back and reflect on our legacy. What will it be?

At our November General Assembly, our Treasurer, Dean Milonas, addressed our upcoming 2013 budget. For all of the blessings we have received, we must reflect on the numbers that he spoke of. Our parish continues to attract new members, and while we have seen a modest increase in the average pledged amount, as Dean pointed out, the current trend is not sustainable. Actual 2012 expenses are up by 4%, while stewardship dollars actually received as of today are off by 3%.

Our 2012 budget called for a deficit of

\$16,000 and we anticipated net income from our annual festival to reach \$47,000. Attendance was down this year and preliminary numbers indicate that we may fall short, resulting in an even larger actual deficit.

As discussed, expenses continue to increase and the proposed budget for 2013 projects a \$30,000 deficit. If the current trends continue, within the next two years we will have exhausted our cash reserves, and we may not be able to meet our monthly expenses unless we make some difficult decisions.

These are the facts.

Recently we have been focused on stewardship in the broader sense, of Time and Talent, in addition to that of Treasure. We believe that if we have 170 plus stewards, all in with their time and talent, we won't need to be concerned about treasure at all. The fact that we have to be concerned about a projected 2013 budget deficit of \$30,000 might mean that we have more work to do in terms of giving of our time and talent.

And that is my appeal to you.

We delivered 40 handmade Huggy Heart pillows to John C. Lincoln North Hospital for their Cardiac ICU. John C. Lincoln loved them so much; they asked us to deliver 35 pillows quarterly starting this January. Each pillow comes with a small pocket in front that holds a St. Anna's Philoptochos calling card to assist in our outreach ministry. Well done, Sacred Sewing Circle!! Donations will be gladly accepted to purchase fiberfill and material.

We next meet on Dec. 3 at 6 pm for our Christmas potluck, followed by a quick meeting at 7 pm, and finally Bunco.

Community Christmas Card




The Great I Came's of Jesus

"For God so loved the world that He gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life."
John 3:16

A perfect book to read during the month of December as we celebrate the birth of Jesus Christ is Coniaris' novel, *The Great I Came's of Jesus*.

Do you remember the first time you wondered or asked, "Why did Christ come to the world?" Most of us may answer what we know from Saint John and what we hear in the liturgy: "to save us." Author Coniaris, in his usual inspiring style, writes of this and the many other reasons why Jesus came to us. He recites from both Old and New Testament scripture and from early church Fathers.



Coniaris writes that "Jesus came in the Father's name... He came to tell you that you are loved, you are forgiven, you are by grace God's son or daughter. He is ready to pour His life and power into you, to overcome your death, to make you an heir of His eternal Kingdom."

Meditations, poetry and prayers highlight the text and delight the soul. A few samples follow:

Oh Divine Light, brighter than the sun, come! Dispel the darkness of sin and

despair. Turn our sunsets into sunrises. Prepare us for the eternal city where there will be no night but the light of the Lamb shining in eternal glory. Amen.

May the thought of death be a constant reminder, dear Lord, that we are pilgrims living in tents. Help us to travel lightly, sharing our talents and provisions with our fellow pilgrims till we arrive into Your Blessed Presence. Amen.

Lord, if this is the purpose for which You came to this painful hour of Your life: to love me and save me and forgive me and resurrect me and give me fullness of life, then let this be the purpose for which I have come to this hour of my life: to love You and serve You and glorify You in all that I say and do. Amen.

This book will truly inspire you and help you reflect on our Lord's birth and what blessings His coming gives us. If not for yourself, gift this book to another for a Christmas message that enchants and lingers the whole year through!

Stewardship is not about us writing checks, it is about our salvation. Are you in 100%? In ordering your own priorities, where does time for Church come? We have a bible study group which meets regularly, book club, sewing circles, choir, men's choir, Philoptochos, Sunday school, Caring Friends, youth group, regular divine services, and the list goes on. Where do you fit in? Are you in 100%?

Our St. Haralambos mission statement says that we "keep, practice and proclaim the Orthodox Christian faith as a living presence to those around us." There are so many ways for you to get involved right now, to live our parish mission statement, and if we

don't currently have a group or ministry that you want to see, why not take ownership and start it? Are you in 100%? My vision is that in 2013, we have 180, and even more, active stewards prioritizing their time so that they are keeping and practicing their faith as a living presence to those around us. That we have new stewards seeking us out because they want to be a part of our growing, spiritually thriving Church. That we have not only our current programs and ministries, but several new ones that we haven't even thought of as yet, and that each one is well attended by a growing number of involved and excited parishioners. Are you in 100%?

Building on that excitement, each of

us taking ownership here at our Church for what is important to us, we won't have to be concerned at all about our 2013 budget deficit. In fact, it is my prediction that we will end 2013 with a budget surplus to apply against our mortgage, ultimately lessening the time it takes to pay it off. Are you in 100%?

I anticipate in 2037, when that future generation looks back upon our legacy, they will say that it was in 2013 that our parish of St. Haralambos was lit on fire by the Holy Spirit and became exactly what our mission statement says we are, "A loving, Christ-centered community whose mission is to keep, practice and proclaim our Orthodox Christian Faith as a living presence to those around us." Are YOU in 100%?
