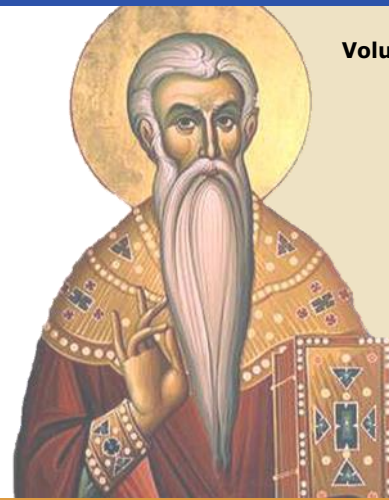

Perryville Prison Crochet Ministry

The Crochet Ministry at Perryville Prison in Goodyear has grown considerably in the past six months. Each month more and more inmates are signing up to learn a new skill and contribute to making new baby blankets, toys, hats and slippers. Each month we collect the finished items and they are given to Phoenix Children's Hospital and Maggie's House to benefit the children and families they serve.

Please help this ministry by donating yarn – either leftovers from finished projects, or by purchasing new yarn from a local craft store.

All donated yarn is delivered to the prison once a month. Yarn donations can be dropped off Monday-Friday 10 am – 3 pm, or after Sunday services. The donation box is in the observation area where refreshments are served on Sunday morning.

Father's Day

Erma Louise Bombeck was an American humorist who achieved great popularity for her newspaper column that described suburban home life from the mid-1960s until the late 1990s. In honor of Father's Day (Sunday, June 17), here is a reprint of an article by Ms. Bombeck that shines a light on some of the good that fathers do.

What Does A Father Do?

I received a letter from a single mother who had raised a son who was about to become a dad. Since he had no recollection of his own father, her question to me was "What do I tell him a father does?"

When my dad died in my ninth year, I, too, was raised by my mother, giving rise to the same question, "What do fathers do?" As far as I could observe, they brought around the car when it rained so everyone else could stay dry.

They always took the family pictures, which is why they were never in them. They carved turkeys on Thanksgiving, kept the car gassed up, weren't afraid to go into the basement, mowed the lawn, and tightened the clothesline to keep it from sagging.

It wasn't until my husband and I had children that I was able to observe firsthand what a father contributed to a child's life. What did he do to deserve his children's respect? He rarely fed them, did anything about their sagging diapers, wiped their noses or fannies, played ball, or bonded with them under the hoods of their cars.

What did he do?

He threw them higher than his head until they were weak from laughter. He cast the deciding vote on the

puppy debate. He listened more than he talked. He let them make mistakes. He allowed them to fall from their first two-wheeler without having a heart attack. He read a newspaper while they were trying to parallel park a car for the first time in preparation for their driving test.

If I had to tell someone's son what a father really does that is important, it would be that he shows up for the job in good times and bad times. He's a man who is constantly being observed by his children. They learn from him how to handle adversity, anger, disappointment and success.

He won't laugh at their dreams no matter how impossible they might seem.

He won't laugh at their dreams no matter how impossible they might seem. He will dig out at 1 a.m. when one of his children runs out of gas.

He will make unpopular decisions and stand by them. When he is wrong and makes a mistake, he will admit it. He sets the tone for how family members treat one another, members of the opposite sex and people who are different than they are. By example, he can instill a desire to give something back to the community when its needs are greater than theirs.

But mostly, a good father involves himself in his kids' lives. The more responsibility he has for a child, the harder it is to walk out of his life. A father has the potential to be a powerful force in the life of a child. Grab it! Maybe you'll get a greeting card for your efforts. Maybe not. But it's steady work.

The Day it was Raining Flowers

This year on Apr. 19, the Thursday of Thomas week, our Gathering of Prayer group met at Sunland Cemetery in Sun City for our first Paschal Season cemetery blessing. This seasonal blessing likely predates the 4th Century as St. John Chrysostom referred to it in his writings as a customary practice. In returning to this annual tradition, our parish will be a living witness to Christ's victory over death. Our visible presence at the cemeteries where our loved ones await the final coming of the Lord is an affirmation of hope and faith.

Our little group chanted with Fr. Michael to bless the cemetery in general, and then visited several gravesites for individual blessings, chanting and Psalm readings. An attentive groundskeeper showed up at just the right time to shut off the sprinklers for us to complete our last visit. It was wonderful to celebrate Pascha by softly singing "Christ is Risen" among the graves with tiny purple flowers underfoot.

It was a breezy, cool and bright day, with yellow Palo Verde trees raining little yellow blooms everywhere. "As the flame of a fire cannot be prevented from ascending upwards, so the prayers of the compassionate cannot be held back from ascending to heaven." (St. Isaac of Syria)

Next year, we'll return to the more traditional Tuesday of Thomas week for our visit to Resthaven Cemetery. Please feel welcome to join us next year – you don't have to be a member of the prayer group to participate!

Missions Possible

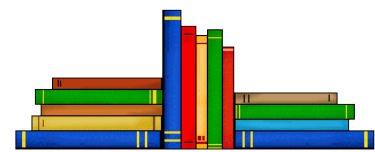

We wish you God's blessings for a safe, happy, healthy, and enjoyable summer.

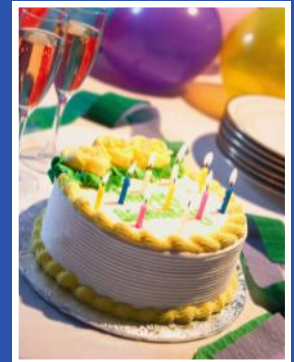
